2:15 Lytton John Musselman

Hulls, Hogs, Harvard, Hampton Boulevard: The ecological and historical value of the Blackwater Ecologic Preserve

The Blackwater Preserve contains one of the last intact longleaf pine communities in Virginia and is home to some of the rarest elements of the Virginia flora. It is also historic, having been studied by the eminent Harvard botanist Merritt Lyndon Fernald in the 1930s. Also of historic and archeological value are the last known remnants of the naval stores industry in Virginia including tarkels and turpentine stumps.

The Speakers

John Seiler or "Dr. Dendro" has been a member of the faculty in the Department of Forest Resources and Environmental Conservation at Virginia Tech since 1985. He earned his B.S. degrees and M.S. degree from Penn State University and his Ph.D. from Virginia Tech. He has been studying trees for nearly 40 years. In 2010, he was named a University Alumni Distinguished. He answers hundreds of tree related questions submitted by the public through the free vTree app. His team has developed

award-winning multimedia tutorials, and made Virginia Tech the number one web site for tree identification.

Desiree Narango is a Ph.D. candidate in entomology and wildlife ecology at the University of Delaware and a research associate at the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center. Her advisors are Doug Tallamy (University of Delaware) and Peter Marra (Smithsonian Institution). Her interests include urban ecology, plant-animal interactions, and citizen science. She has an M.S. from The Ohio State University, a B.S. from SUNY: ESF and more than 12 years' experience studying wildlife. An active birder and gardener, she enjoys getting others excited about the natural world in their own backyards.

Ryan Klopf is the mountain region steward and regional supervisor for the Virginia Natural Heritage Program. Ryan has a B.S. from the College of William and Mary, and a Ph.D. in plant biology from Southern Illinois University.

Lytton John Musselman is the Mary Payne Hogan Professor of Botany at Old Dominion University and served as Chair in biological sciences. In 1984 he founded the Blackwater Ecologic Preserve in Isle of Wight County and is its manager. The Zuni Pine Barrens Natural Area Preserve was soon established on contiguous land. He has taught at several universities and biological field stations in the U.S. and at universities in the Near East. He cowrote a book with David Knepper on Chesapeake Bay plants and a 2013 guide to edible plants with Harold Wiggins.
