Small bluets (Houstonia pusilla) were found in the grass next to the parking lot.



This area in summer is solid green with invasive Japanese stilt grass (Microstegium vimineum). In winter it dies back leaving mostly bare ground.

The trail goes down the Appomattox river from the parking lot, then after crossing a marsh on a boardwalk branches. One branch continues along the river and the other (which we took) goes

away from the river

and between a marsh and some hills, looping back to Green and Gold (Chrysogonum the parking lot. The
