*These stately ferns will be available at the Potowmack Chapter Native Plant Sale, September 15. They are suitable for moist, shady locations. Each species has large attractive sterile fronds and separate spore-bearing fertile fronds.*

The Potowmack Chapter will be selling native plants at Green Spring's Fall Fling Festival (see page 3) on Saturday, September 15, between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. The propagation volunteers have been working overtime this summer to keep the plants watered and ready for sale. Green Spring's special program will be on pollinators, and many of the natives we'll be selling will attract those pollinators and the other wildlife associated with them.

Since fall is the best time to plant--the warm soil promotes good root growth until the ground freezes-- this is a great opportunity to select from our wide variety of plants. We'll be offering over six varieties of ferns, some very large. Several new plants will be offered that are indigenous to the Chesapeake Bay Watershed: *Gentiana clausa* (Bottle Gentian), *Liatris pilosa* (Shaggy Blazingstar) and *Scutellaria integrifolia* (Hyssop Skullcap). We're offering many good reasons to remove some of your time-consuming turf and plant some natives. Besides their beauty, you'll be giving back to the environment.

Anyone with native plants to share may donate them for the sale. Give us a call or bring them to our propagation beds behind the horticultural center at Green Spring. Anyone wanting to get more involved in natives plants is welcome to join us Wednesday mornings when we pot plants and weed beds. Plants and Pollinators are the focus of the **Fall Fling Festival on September 15th at Green Spring Gardens** 9am to 4pm, co-sponsored by the **Virginia Native Plant Society**. The day will be full of educational and fun events that will highlight pollinators from the monarch butterfly to the secret pollinators of the night. For families, the popular **Monarch Magic** program will explore the wonders of metamorphosis with one of the animal world's most charismatic butterflies. Drop in between 10 a.m. and 3 pm. and learn about monarchs, do a craft and adopt a butterfly larva to take home and raise.

For adults, the morning begins with refreshments at 9:30 and a chance to bid on silent auction offerings. At 10 a.m., take a seat in the multi-purpose room to learn about the complexities of the relationship between plants and pollinators. **Dr. David Carr**, curator of the Orlando E. White Arboretum at Blandly, will share his research into the fascinating pollination game. **Dr. David Inouye**, a biology professor at the University of Maryland who specializes in plant-animal interactions and conservation biology, will profile the intriguing pollinators that inhabit the evening landscape.

At one o'clock, the buzz will be about honeybees during a delightful, and delicious, Tea at the Historic House program. The Green Spring Master Gardeners will be on hand all day at their habitat garden to offer advice on pollinator-friendly gardening. The Fall Fling Festival is an important fundraiser for the Friends of Green Spring; all proceeds support the educational programs at the gardens. ### HUNTLEY MEADOWS PARK WETLAND RESTORATION PROJECT

A wetland restoration plan for Huntley Meadows Park is in the concept/design phase. This undertaking will

require major work in the main wetland area and will permanently alter the nature of the park's wetlands. It's important for our chapter to be informed about the plan's options and to be aware of the opportunities for public comment. There are some serious issues regarding the plant community in the wetland. Part of the plan revolves around planting in the wetland. This is a somewhat controversial issue in native plant restoration projects. Since Huntley Meadows is a VNPS registry site, our chapter should be aware of the issues surrounding this plan.
