### Lorton Surveys To Begin Again, Targeting Spring Ephemerals

# Potowmack Members Play Role In Educating The Community On Native Plants

Potowmack Chapter member Beth Smith will speak at the 3rd annual National Wildlife Federation Gardening For Community and Wildlife Event on Sunday, March 22. Beth's lecture is titled "Gardening for Community and Wildlife, A Case History," and is the last of three lectures beginning at 1 p.m. (the other two are "Native Plants, Water Garden, Bird Supplies and More" offered by David Yost and "Creating Your Backyard Wildlife Habitat by Craig Tufts"). Beth's yard and the gardens she has created at Pohick Regional Library will be on display during self-paced garden tours following the lectures. This series is offered by the Merrifield Garden Center at their Fair Oaks location and costs only a \$5 donation to the National Wildlife Federation. Registration begins at 12:30 p.m. For more information, contact the Merrifield Garden Center at 560-6222.

Using a different educational format, member and popular lecturer Marion Lobstein has announced the availability of a new video she has created titled "Spring Wildflowers of the Mid-Atlantic Region." The video features 100 common species of spring wildflowers with information on their identification as well as medicinal and edible uses, life cycle information, conservation, and plants to be avoided (such as poison ivy). Marion's co-authors are John DeMary, a teacher and naturalist, and Suzanne Lohr, also a teacher. ### Trillium Walk Scheduled Earlier This Year--April 23

The 6th annual spring walk through the Virginia Native Plant Society's first Registry Site, The G. Richard Thompson Wildlife Management Area, is planned for Thursday, April 23. This leisurely, informal stroll through quiet spring woodlands is held on a weekday to avoid the crowds that visit this extraordinary place on weekends.

Due to the mildness of the winter it is believed the flowers will be earlier this year. The usual peak time is the first week in May The site is famous for its dense stands of Trillium grandiflorum and other native ephemerals. The state-owned preserve straddles the Fauquier-Warren County line on the slopes of Blue Mountain near Linden. Participants usually spend 1-2 hours on the mountain Lunch and a rest stop are available at the Apple House Restaurant on Route 55 in nearby Linden.

Several species of migrating birds are usually seen and heard in abundance at this time, including scarlet tanagers, rufous-sided swhees, and wood thrushes.

A carpool will be organized to leave Fair Oaks Mall at 9:30 a.m. if there is sufficient interest. The trip to Linden is about an hour starting from there via Route 66. For printed details and directions call Anne Crocker at 437-0355 between 5 and 7 p.m.

Spring Plant Sale Scheduled For May 16, 1998

After an unusual winter (often blamed on poor little El Niño), most of us are looking forward to getting outdoors and digging in the dirt and are full of plans to beautify our landscapes. It's been a very lackluster winter with only one meager snowstorm to break the monotony.

To those of us active in the propagation beds at Green Spring, spring means a very active season preparing for our annual spring sale. We will be potting up plants for the sale as soon as the weather permits. We urge you to think of the VNPS sale as you divide your perennial native plants this spring. The public is very anxious to include native plants in their gardens and we on the committee depend on our members to supplement the number and variety of native plants offered.


We especially welcome ferns, woody plants, and spring ephemerals since these plants are not easily propagated in our chapter beds. If you are planning to contribute plants, please pot them up by the first week in May. Transplanting often stresses plants and we want to be certain that all plants we offer to the public are healthy and in good shape. Of course, ephemerals may look pretty sad by mid-May but that's to be expected.

In addition to plants, we would appreciate your plastic pots (4-, 5-, and 6-inch size; no market packs or clay pots, please). You can bring them to the propagation beds at Green Spring and deposit them near our potting table. While you're there, notice the brand new park sign installed last fall.

Our successful plant sales have enabled us to contribute to the continuing development of the Native Plant Trail at Green Spring. The chapter supports efforts to make the trail more user friendly by encouraging interpretation. We are anticipating a new brochure some wayside stations on the trail, and the training of a core of our members to lead tours through the trail. The financial contributions budgeted by our chapter this year have been earmarked to hire an intern to accomplish these ends.
