Native Bog Plants

Mike Hollins will introduce us to the fascinating world of bogs and bog plants at our May meeting. Mike is involved in rebuilding wetlands and in stream restoration through his business, Envirens, Inc. in Cockeysville, Maryland. He also has a nursery which specializes in plants for wetlands. We are very fortunate to have Mike come to do this program for our chapter and hope our members will take advantage of this opportunity to learn more about bogs and wetlands, another disappearing native habitat.

Buy Stamps – **Preserve Wetlands**

In an effort to help preserve wetlands, the Virginia Federation of Garden Clubs is selling pitcher-plant stamps (similar to Easter seals). Proceeds go to The Nature Conservancy to help preserve the barrier islands, 35,000 acres of wetlands along Virginia's coast.

Piedmont Chapter member Holley Green is the garden club's Shenandoah District representative for the pitcher-plant project. Since this is such a natural tie-in with our May meeting Holley has been invited to be at the meeting with stamps which can be purchased. If you can't make it to the meeting order directly from Holley (703-347-7663, Rt. 4, Box 270A, Warrenton, VA 22186). Cost is \$2.50 per sheet of 30 stamps. Holley will have propagated pitcher-plants and preserved leaves (great for arrangements) for sale in the fall with profits also going to The Nature Conservancy.

Bird Walks



Great Plant Sale


