

# 1:00 p.m., Sunday, October 6, 1996 Occoquan Forest

Members received a notice of the annual meeting with a ballot in a special mailing sent out in early September. The meeting will begin with a pot luck picnic at 1:00 p.m. Bring a salad, vegetable or main dish to share. Beverages, bread, desserts, plates and utensils will be furnished. The annual meeting will be at 2:00 p.m. with election of officers for the coming two years (please return ballot if you can't come) and voting on the 1997 proposed budget (see page 2). Directions: From Manassas: take the Prince William Parkway toward Woodbridge, make a left onto Davis Ford Rd. Cross the Occoquan River and make the first left which is Split Rail Dr. into Occoquan Forest. Follow Split Rail Dr. to the end and meet at the pavilion. From Woodbridge: take the Prince William Parkway toward Manassas; turn right onto Davis Ford Rd. and follow above directions. Be careful to keep your speed down to 25 mph in Occoquan Forest.

The VNPS has chosen columbine (Aquilegia canadensis) for its 1998 wildflower of the year. The 1997 wildflower is fringe tree (Chionanthus virginicus), and other natives that have been honored are:

1996 White trillium, Trillium grandiflorum

1995 New York ironweed, Vernonia

1994 Mountain laurel. Kalmia latifolia

1993 Wild bergamot, Monarda fistulosa

1992 Butterfly weed, Asclepias tuberosa 1991 Cardinal flower, Lobelia cardinalis

1991 Cardinal flower, Lobelia cardinalis 1990 Spring beauty, Claytonia virginica

1989 Virginia bluebell, Mertensia virginica
