

Plant Ridge and Valley Natives Campaign Update

Last Spring, we had 2000 copies of our regional guide book, Plant Ridge& Valley Natives, printed by Mid-Valley Press in Verona VA, and the response was amazing. We were thrilled to hear the accolades and to know that the book was guiding gardeners towards planting native plants in their home gardens and landscapes. We are planning now to revise this winter and to release a second edition in Spring 2024. We raised \$15,000 to support the first printing and will need about that much again to pay for the next printing. Sales have allowed us to raise some

process in InDesign, and Barbara will organize the volunteers and distribution. We plan to use Mid-Valley Press again for the printing since they did a great job with our first edition. Isaac has volunteered to manage the photos as he did on the first printing.

The regional Plant Ridge & Valley Natives campaign covers not only the five counties included in the Shenandoah Chapter, but also six more. The Virginia Ridge & Valley (also called the "Mountain" region in state publications) includes Frederick, Clarke, Shenandoah, Warren, Page, Rockingham, Highland, Augusta, Bath, Rockbridge, and Alleghany counties.

Our campaign is part of a state-wide effort to promote native plants for home gardening and landscapes. This effort originated under the leadership of Virginia Witmer from the VA Department of Environmental Quality in the Coastal Zone as part of the Chesapeake Bay clean-up efforts and has spread state-wide due to its usefulness and popularity. 
Besides the extensive work of publishing the guide, our campaign has also worked with appropriate retail outlets to offer the guides for sale. Those include the following garden centers in Augusta County who have also stocked native plants for sale: JMD Garden Center, Milmont Greenhouses, and Waynesboro Landscape and Garden Center. The Secret Garden in Staunton, Stone Soup Bookstore in Waynesboro, and the Edith Carrier Arboretum shop in Harrisonburg are also selling our guide book. Thanks to Eunice Sill, Kelly Mason, Susan Beachy, and others who have reached out individually to local garden centers. If you would be willing to help with the work of partnering with more garden centers, particularly in counties in other areas of our campaign region, to encourage them to carry more native plants, and to affirm them when they do, please contact Barbara. We plan to provide signage with the Ridge & Valley Natives logo to indicate regionally native species and want to have volunteers check periodically for accuracy in displays.

Another project of the R & V campaign that is in process is distributing the plant guides to all regional libraries, library branches and independent libraries in our 11-county region. This has been made possible through the generosity of one of our partners, the VA Department of WildlifeResources, who is supplying the 32 books needed for this effort. We are also offering planting/design consultations to the 8 regional libraries if they are interested in planting a native plant garden on site.
