

January Musings

When the autumn leaves are down and brown, we start looking for the pinstripe leaves of puttyroot, *Aplectrum hyemale*. Its strategy is to put up a single leaf over the winter to mine the sun's energy without interference from leafy trees. In late spring, the leaf withers and the flower stalk appears. The flowers then become brown seed pods on a 12-inch stalk. The rather unlovely common name refers to a mucilaginous substance derived from the corms. *Aplectrum* describes the lack of a nectar spur on the flower and *hyemale* describes the winter emergence.





The seed pods are full of dust-sized seeds, but puttyroot also reproduces underground via its corms. With all our attention to puttyroot, we have yet to see flowers. That will be our mission this summer. Until then, we'll enjoy the overwintering leaves as a sign that spring will prevail.

Our chapter treasurer and Virginia Native Seed Project coordinator, Isaac Matlock, was invited to attend the Blue Ridge PRISM Future Search workshop. The purpose of this three-day event was to identify and launch a series of new statewide initiatives and actions plans to make significant progress against invasive plants. This workshop also focused on the role that advocating for the use and increased accessibility of native plants.

"I feel that this event was extremely valuable. Although, it can be overwhelming to really think about how much work needs to be down to reduce invasive species in Virginia, I felt that even the action of getting all these organizations in the same place made a small difference. I felt that we all left there as one mind and a unified voice across all the participating individuals and their associated organizations."




Native Plant Production Webinar

On December 16th our own Isaac Matlock presented a webinar for the Chapter Native: Plant Production: Collection, Storage, and Propagation. This informative and free webinar started with information regarding The Clifton Institute and its Native Seed Pilot Project. This grant-funded project, led by Isaac, is working to collect local ecotype seeds from a variety of native plants and partnering with farmers to grow the seeds with the end goal of eventually having these seeds available commercially.

The webinar was a detailed how-to for anyone interested in collecting seeds or just starting to grow native seeds for the first time. Isaac covered the necessary supplies, check-lists to help plan ahead, protocols for how to collect different types of seeds, and how to clean and store seeds. Next, Isaac discussed germination strategies, how he determines when to sow various species, and seed starting mixes. The webinar lasted just under two hours and is available for free on our chapter website here.



Plant Ridge and Valley Natives Campaign Update

Last Spring, we had 2000 copies of our regional guide book, Plant Ridge& Valley Natives, printed by Mid-Valley Press in Verona VA, and the response was amazing. We were thrilled to hear the accolades and to know that the book was guiding

The regional Plant Ridge & Valley Natives campaign covers not only the five counties included in the Shenandoah Chapter, but also six more. The Virginia Ridge & Valley (also called the "Mountain" region in state publications) includes Frederick, Clarke, Shenandoah, Warren, Page, Rockingham, Highland, Augusta, Bath, Rockbridge, and Alleghany counties.

Our campaign is part of a state-wide effort to promote native plants for home gardening and landscapes. This effort originated under the leadership of Virginia Witmer from the VA Department of Environmental Quality in the Coastal Zone as part of the Chesapeake Bay clean-up efforts and has spread state-wide due to its usefulness and popularity. 
This fall and throughout 2024, the state-wide native plants campaign is focusing on encouraging folks to plant more native trees and shrubs.
