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
installations during her summer breaks. She is volunteering at the Wildlife Center of Virginia and enjoys just about anything outdoors.

Blue Ridge PRISM Weed Alert

Because it has no known natural predators in North America, burning bush (*Euonymus alatus*) can spread undisturbed through its prodigious seeds and extensive root system. This paired with its ability to grow under a mature forest canopy means that burning bush can outcompete native woody and herbaceous

habitat diversity in our ecosystem.

Despite its demonstrated invasive qualities, burning bush remains a popular landscaping shrub and is still sold in nurseries in many parts of the United States. This continued popularity is one of the challenges in controlling this invasive species.
