President's Column

The trees are finally mostly bare of leaves. I have noticed a fair amount of mistletoe, which is a parasite and not harmful to the trees on which it grows. Birds are singing a great deal; we have ospreys and bald eagles fishing in Hebden Cove off the Lynnhaven River.

We got the first 250 plugs for the plant sale potted up this past week; Sandy Ricks and Pat Quinn helped supply additional pots and we got others from McDonalds Nursery recycling bin. Kit Hayden, a previous member (and past president) now a new member, helped pot up some of the plants for the sale. Kit has graciously offered to allow us to dig plants in her yard (she calls it thinning the herd) on Monday, March 23, for the plant sale. If you're interested in participating, she might allow us to take a few for our own use as well. Kit and Bill Hayden live on Great Neck in Virginia Beach and her yard is absolutely fantastic! Our March 26 meeting will be focused on how we handle the plant sale...the sale itself will be on April 4, 9 am to 3 pm, at Francis Land House in Virginia Beach. We will start setting up at 7am. We need some more bodies for set up and during the sale to help buyers, tally purchases, etc. Please contact me to sign up. I got a question from a former member on why we put so much effort on raising money for VNPS through the plant sale. Excellent question. We collectively donate a pretty good amount of the profits to conservation and educational organizations. We donated heavily to help publish "Flora of Virginia" as well as the phone app. We helped state VNPS to raise funds to help Virginia DCR secure properties which have rare plant species. We donated \$1000 to Paradise Creek Nature Park to plant several

native trees to shade their children's playground. We donate regularly to Lynnhaven River Now, Elizabeth River Project, Chesapeake Bay Foundation. We tend to sell our plants at a price level far below what you would see at Lowes, Home Depot, McDonalds or any other retail nursery, which encourages people to put natives in the ground instead of fancy Asian, African or European plants. Our plants feed the bugs, which feed the birds, small mammals, lizards and snakes. Our plants are the basic food source for nature's animals.

I hope to see you at our March 26 plant sale planning meeting; there might be a few surprises, too! Also, let's show up to see Stuart McCausland in April, he might even videotape the presentation! I will be potting up 96 more plants this first week after the clock clicked forward, all Geranium Maculatum or Wild Geranium - the 2020 wildflower of the year for VNPS.

More on the Plant Sale

We already have 350 plants in hand, all perennials, including Bearded Tongue (*Penstemon digitalis*), Wild Columbine (*aquilegia canadensis*), Cardinal flower (*lobelia cardinalis*), Short tooth Mountain Mint (*pycnanthemum muticum*), Robin's Plantain - Lynnhaven Carpet (*erigeron pulchellus*) and Wild Geranium (*geranium maculatum*). We expect to have over 2000 plants, likely many more. We often do not know which plants will be available until a couple days prior to the sale (depends on how they look at the supplier, we tend to only take plants that at least have broken soil). Further, two of our in-house vendors tend to bring several hundred plants and the list doesn't come to us until the week of the event. Vickie Shufer (plant and wildlife columnist in Va Pilot) and Byron Carmean (Retired VT professor and co-author of "big trees in VA") are our two in-house vendors, they grow a good number of Virginia Natives.

As far as prices go, we might have some smaller plants for as little as \$3; most moderate size plants \$5-\$12; shrubs and trees from \$4 to \$25 or more. Sometimes we price based on how they look, also.

We don't post a list but the spring sale this year will be concentrated on spring and summer blooming plants and shrubs/trees; the fall sale in October will be late season bloomers like asters, goldenrod, obedient plants, blue mist flower.

We start selling **at 9am** on April 4 at Francis Land House in Virginia Beach (Virginia Beach Blvd at Kings Grant Road, March 2020

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
